#### Death of Mrs. H. B. Carroll.

Mrs. Ida Underwood Carroll, wife of Mr. H. B. Carroll, died at her home on Maple avenue, this place, at about 8 o'clock a. m. Wednesday, July 15, 1908, after only a few hours illness of apoplexy, aged 55 years. The deceased had been in her usual health and on Tuesday she went to the Presbyterian church to attend a union meeting of the Loring Circle and the Woman's Missionary Society being held in the church. Soon after she arrived at the church she became ill and in a short time passed into unconsciousness from which condition she did not recover but died at the hour and date named above. When she was stricken in the church Dr. Timmons was called and he together with others did everything possible to revive the sick lady but every effort failed. A cot was secured and the unconscious woman was taken to her home on Maple avenue where she remained in this unconscious condition until death came.

Mrs. Carroll was a daughter of the late Mr. Clark M. Underwood, formerly of near Beham, Pa., but who died about 12 years ago at his home near Monongahela, Pa. Mrs. Underwood, mother of Mrs. Carroll, died in this borough about three years ago. Mrs. Ida Underwood Carroll was born in Cincinnati, O., Feb. 16, 1853. When quite young the family removed to St. Louis, Mo., and later to a farm known as the Alex. Anderson farm near Claysville, Pa., and still later to the farm near Beham, Pa., now owned by John Black. While living on the Black farm the deceased was married to Mr. Carroll, June 4, 1875. To this union seven children were born as follows: Dr. Chas. E. of Pittsburg, Blaine, at home, and Stanley are the sons. Harriet R., Grace and Beatrice at home, and Jannette, wife of Ralph R. Roney of East Main street, this place, are the daughters. The children are all living except Stanley, twin brother of Miss Beatrice, who died July 20, 1904. The following brothers and sister survive Chas. F. Underwood, of Iowa; E. E. Underwood, of Nebraska; Dr. F. H. Underwood, of Monongahela, Pa., and Mrs. Margaret Street, of California. All of the brothers and sister are attending the funeral.
